Fabulous Flora

Wollemi pine, the dinosaur plant

It may be one of the major botanic finds in history! The recent discovery of the Wollemi Pine is akin to finding a live dinosaur right in your backyard.

The Wollemi was discovered in 1994, in a remote area of Sydney's Blue Mountains by David Noble, a NSW National Parks and Wildlife officer and keen bushwalker. Its discovery has prompted great scientific interest worldwide.

During extensive trials, the Wollemi pine has proved hardy and reliable and suitable for larger gardens. With its attractive dark green foliage it is perfect as a specimen in a pot.

Retailers have been selected to display and sell Wollemis throughout Australia.

Grafting for reliability

Some Australian plants are not reliable on their own rootstock, especially in heavy soils. These temperamental plants are now available as hardier but more expensive grafted specimens:

A Natural Balance in your Garden

Natural Pest Management

To deal with pests effectively the first step is to identify the problem. Your accredited garden centre has horticulturists on duty to help you identify what is causing damage to the plant.

Using a sledge hammer approach to garden pests is costly, damaging to the environment and to your health. We recommend using the least toxic solution possible.

In most cases, it is possible to solve garden problems using natural methods.

Prevention is better than cure

❁ Improve plant health

Healthy plants are less affected by pests and diseases, so build up the health of the garden by improving the soil and adding organic fertilisers. An organic mulch will reduce stress from high temperatures and insulate the soil from cold in winter.

❁ The right plant for the right position

Many problems in the garden are caused by placing plants in the wrong position - shade lovers in the full sun, or sun lovers in shade. Dry area plants may rot and develop fungal problems in boggy spots, and plants from wetter climates usually struggle in our hot dry summers.

❁ Hygiene in the garden

Pruning crossing branches, or dense foliage to let in the sun may be all that is needed to combat fungal disease or insect attack. It is wise to clean secateurs between bushes. Raking fallen leaves and branches, and disposing of them will prevent the spread of disease.



Gardens in balance

When selecting a product to treat garden problems, choose one which will have little or no impact on the rest of the garden. Dipel, a biological control, kills only caterpillars. Multiguard, an iron compound, kills slugs and snails.

Some pesticides are organic and serve as a repellent. Garlic chilli pyrethrum are helpful in keeping pests away from precious plants. Beat a Bug is a product with all three and may be kept in the garden shed to spray on plants when there are aphids, thrips or other pests around.

Home made mixes

The following recipes come from organic gardener Jean Hooper

Garlic Insecticide

100g chopped garlic

1 tbs kerosene

Cover and stand for 48 hours

Mix: Half a litre warm water with 30g pure soap shaved. Add to garlic and strain.

Use at 15mls per litre for spray.

Controls most insects.

Fruit fly lure

Mix together:

1 litre water

3tbs sugar

1 1/2tbs cloudy ammonia

1 1/2 tsp vanilla essence

a few drops detergent

Take a prepared trap and pour a depth of about 3cms lure inside. Replace cap and hang 3 to 4 traps in each mature tree. The detergent destroys the surface tension so the fly can not stand on the water.

(A simple trap can be made from 500mm plastic cool drink containers.)

What's New?

Recipe for delicious fun

- 1 large Tuscan pot
- 1 bag organic potting mix
- a punnet of leafy greens
- a packet of baby carrots

1. Fill pot with potting mix
2. Space out and plant leafy greens in the centre of the pot.
3. Use a finger to draw a line 60cms from the edge of pot.
4. Mix carrot seed with clean sand or potting mix, and sprinkle mixture in the circle you have made.
5. Gently water the pot, and put in a sunny spot.
- 6 Water every few days unless it rains.
- 7 As carrots grow, they may be thinned out by removing some of the seedlings.

Yum! Enjoy.

Other ideas for pot gardens

Herb pot

Plant four herbs, one in the middle and three around the outside.

Use either rosemary, oregano or marjoram in the centre, and short lived parsley, chives, coriander around the edge.



Pansy fun

Plant a punnet of pansies in the centre then surround with white lobelia.
