THE TOP 10 SUMMER FLOWERING BEAUTIES

With water shortages on the horizon, it makes sense to choose drought hardy plants for the summer garden. They must have pretty flowers, of course, and we need look no further than our own Australian native plants for hardy colourful plants. The following are our top ten summer flowering Aussie native plants.

1. Native Hibiscus

Alyogyne huegelii — This lovely native hibiscus is a drought hardy WA shrub to 2m, fast growing with spectacular mauve flowers.



2. Kangaroo Paws

Anigozanthos hybrids add a splash of colour to your garden all summer long. Superb in a pot, and equally beautiful in a cottage garden they are well known drought hardy plants. Long lasting cut flowers!



3. Rock Daisy

Brachyscome multifida is grown all over the world, and come in a wide range of colours - lemon, pink, mauve and white. This cushion of foliage is well suited to rockeries and hanging baskets, but grows best with twice weekly summer water.

4. Dwarf Heath Myrtle

Baeckea virgata "Miniature", a neat rounded shrub, is perfect as a border or trimmed to a low hedge. It flowers with masses of tiny cool white blooms in summer. It is drought hardy in sun or shade and grows to around 80cms.

5. Sandplain Bottlebrush

Beaufortia squarrosa grows locally in the Perth region. This 1m shrub flowers with fiery red brushes in the harshest of conditions. It grows best in a low fertiliser native garden with light pruning after flowering.

6. Summer Calytrix

Calytrix fraseri is another local shrub to 1m with showy deep pink flowers. Grow it in your garden as a low maintenance summer feature plant.

7. Blue Eyes

Dampiera diversifolia — This low ground cover is popular for its unusual blue flowers. It is widely used in hanging baskets and as a ground cover in light shade. If watered regularly it will grow in full sun.

8. Straw Flowers

Helichrysum baxteri opens its showy white flowrs whenever the sun is shining. A low growing cushion of foliage it is ideal in a hanging basket and well suited for cottage gardens. Butterflies love the Australian daisies.



9. Fan Flowers

Scaevolas are widely grown for their pretty blue mauve or pink flowers. Look for Scaevola "Purple Fanfare", "Pink Perfection" and "Mauve Clusters". Scaevolas are perfect for hanging baskets and ground covers in watered summer gardens.



10. Tropical Grevillea hybrids

These top selling Australian plants are everything the gardener is looking for. Spectacular bird attracting flowers adorn these bushy medium sized shrubs. Choose from Grevillea "Honey Gem" (gold flowers), G. "Superb" (orange-red) G. "Sylvia" (hot pink) and the unusual salmon coloured G. "Kay Williams".

Care of Australian native plants.

It's widely believed that natives do not need any attention - no water and no fertiliser — not true!

While many Australian plants are drought hardy and can survive our scorching summers, most grow best with summer water and slow release fertiliser to promotes healthy growth. In addition applying a coarse organic mulch will protect plant roots from the sun and reduce evaporation.




It's Cool in the Summer Garden

Although the temperature is soaring, there is still plenty to do in the garden. Early morning and late evening are the perfect time to wander around checking the watering and pulling a weed or two.

Grow Sturt Desert Peas

It's easy to grow these Aussie beauties from seed.



Simply choose a sunny well drained site. A large pot works well too with a mix of good potting mix and sharp sand. Place the seed in a cup and pour boiling water over it to break the dormancy. Leave overnight and discard any seeds floating. Plant seeds directly into the soil, three seeds in one spot. Water daily, twice in hot weather when newly germinated. Watch out for snails and insects which find the seedlings delicious.

You may like to sow seeds of a variety of native plants. There is a good range of seeds which grow easily in our region. Use Seed Raising Mix and smoked water for success.

Planting in summer

Sure it takes more work to establish plants in the hot weather, but the reward is more speedy growth. As long as you follow a few simple steps the plants never look back.

- 1. Improve the soil with organic material when planting.
- 2. Soak the plants in a bucket of water while you prepare the soil and fill up the planting hole with water too. Add a soil wetter if water does not soak in quickly.
- 3. Add a teaspoon or two of Native Plant Osmocote to the hole.
- 4. Back fill the plant and gently "puddle" the plant in.
- 5. Cover the area with 5cm plus of coarse mulch to stop the water percolating to the surface and evaporating off.

Hot windy days really suck - suck up the ground water that is!

KANYANA

Plant of the month

Grevillea "Kay Williams" is this month's Kanyana fund raising plant. One of the showy tropical hybrids, it grows to around 2.4m high. Although the label says 1.5m wide, it can grow over 2m wide if left unpruned.



Large spikes of salmon orange flowers occur throughout the year feeding the birds that Kanyana keeps releasing! *G. "Kay Williams"* is ideal as a fairly quick growing screen. The current batch are looking great in 140mm pots at \$9.95 each. One dollar from the sale of each plant goes to Kanyana Wildlife Centre.

Now ready: WA Christmas tree

Nuytsia floribunda

It's almost Christmas and our very unique Christmas tree (Nuytsia floribunda) is showing off its brilliant orange blooms. We have a big batch of cutting grown plants ready for sale at \$9.95 each, all co-planted with some Dichondra repens as a helping host. Christmas semi-parasitic trees are usually attach onto another plants roots — without, it seems, much detrimental effect on the host. In growing a Nuytsia you must have patience, waiting over ten years for flowering to occur. Our '89 model near the nursery bird feeder has not flowered yet! Good luck!




We recommend a couple of litres, or a good spadeful, is stirred in each time you plant. (Use in place of Groganic.)

Budget Potting Mix


For short term growing or less fussy plants, try the new budget potting mix at \$5.95 or 4 for \$22.

Fire Retardants

Although they may be damaged by fire, there are some plants which can slow a fire and reduce property damage. Desirable features of such plants are:

- Slow burning
- Evergreen
- Have very little dry litter as fuel
- Have a high ash content
- Are succulent, or have excess water in the leaves
