Since the last Bush Telegraph, our co-founder and mother has passed away, aged 85. It was a peaceful death at Kalamunda Hospital early evening May 12th with Jackie, daughter Rae and me at her bedside. Friends and family from afar joined us for a simple funeral May 15th.

Jean grew up in the wheatbelt and was farming there and in Esperance until the mid 60's, when after a few years travelling she settled in Gooseberry Hill.

While establishing her garden design business, Jean completed a Cert. of Horticulture. She inspired Jackie and me to join her in establishing Zanthorrea Nursery, and we opened in September 1975.

Although officially retired by 1981, Jean continued working at the nursery for many years. Even in her late 70's, Jean was called on to help with guided walks, and plant ID.

A dedicated volunteer for the Kings Park Guides, Wildflower Society and the Herbarium, Jean was an active retiree, lending a hand to Meals on wheels and others in need.

In December 2005, after a long battle with Parkinson's syndrome and heart disease, Jean left her granny flat on the nursery property for a low care hostel where she continued to prune and plant.

Jean's passion for Australian plants is carried on at Zanthorrea by Alec and Jackie and grandson Ross.

Warm up with Winter Pruning

Tell your plants who's boss!

Do you feel cross when the 1m shrub you bought from the garden centre grows like crazy to 2m high and wide!

Although we'd like to be accurate with plant dimensions, alas, there are many factors that cause unusually vigorous growth in plants: extra water, heavy handed fertiliser, exceptionally fertile soil, shade that causes plants to reach for the sun are just some factors.

The solution to this dilemma is simple. Tell your plants who's boss and learn the not so gentle art of pruning.



Tools you will need in your arsenal

- Sharp, good quality secateurs. Bypass pruners such as Felco No 5 can easily cut to pencil thickness.
- Loppers. Use short or long handled loppers for more serious pruning. I love my rachet loppers that give me more power for pruning entire branches.
- Shears, manual or electric. For neat hedging or pruning plants back from paths, use sharp shears.
- Chainsaws. With an over vivid imagination, I am unable to come within several metres of a chain saw, but for the truly brave pruners, properly sharpened chainsaws will quickly establish who's boss in your garden. You have to be cruel to be kind.

Why bother?

If you love an overgrown garden, and do not feel the need to control the height and spread of plants in your garden, then there may be no need for you to prune. However there are times when gardeners feel the urge to wield the pruning tool!

Benefits of pruning

- 1. Tip pruning is especially useful in encouraging vigorous healthy new growth.
- 2. Pruning stimulates flowering. Pruning after flowering often brings on an extra flush of flowers.
- 3. Dead-heading flowers sends energy into the plant, rather than setting seeds.
- 4. Removing dead or diseased branches will extend the life of the plant. Always clean pruning tool after cutting into diseased wood.
- 5. Hard pruning will rejuvenate woody plants such as mallees and some large flowered grevilleas. (Can be risky with some plants, so seek advice at the garden centre if unsure.)
- 6. Hedges look perfect in formal gardens if pruned regularly.
- 7. Plants can adopt a new look with artistic pruning. Shrubs can become trees or topiary shapes. Trees can be pruned down to size, or up to form a perfect specimen tree.



WARNING: Pruning can be addictive! It is one of the most fun activities in the garden.

Pruning Tips

- Use sharp clean quality tools.
- Cut to just above a node (where the leaf or branch joins).
- Use a slightly sloping cut especially in winter.
- Clean and carefully store pruning tools for next time.
- After pruning can be a good time to re-envigorate plants with a little fertiliser, and a good drink if pruning in summer.

There's still time...just...to plant everlasting seeds. Simply mix a pack of pure seed with a bag of soil improver, and spread over the soil. (Removing weeds and raking area first will help seeds thrive.)

Large packs of 25g cost \$19.95.

If you are in a hurry, Lucindas everlastings are packed in vermiculite and are ready and easy to plant. For a small patch, 10g packs are \$9.95





What's Flowering Now?

Winter flowering Australian beauties include:

• Hakea laurina (pincushion hakea) is a tall shrub or small tree guaranteed to attract a second look when in flower. The unusual red pincushion blooms are attractive both to birds and passers by alike.

• Kunzea baxteri grows naturally in harsh conditions, so is perfectly at home in dry summer gardens. Its dense foliage is suitable for pruning into a medium hedge, or shaping up into a mini tree. Fat red bottle brush flowers have yellow tips that catch the sun.

- Brachysema celcianum or Swan River Pea is another very hardy plant with dense bluish green foliage, perfect for a low screen. Red pea flowers brighten any winter garden.
- The very hardy *Chamelaucium uncinatum* (Geraldton Wax) seems to grow in most soils or situations. The unassuming flowers are perfect for long lasting cut flowers and

come in many shades from white to pink to purple. Geraldton wax is a bushy fast growing medium shrub.

• Hardenbergia comptoniana (native wisteria) grows naturally both in the Perth plains and hills. The splash of purple pea flowers add a touch of colour to the deep green leaves. A vigorous climber, native wisteria is hardy and fast growing.

• Callistemon pollandii: With a little pruning, this bushy tall shrub makes a handsome small tree. Flowering long and prolifically, it is popular with birds and insects.

Sustainable gardening tips

Feed and nurture the soil:

Busy gardeners make the mistake of feeding their plants! It's much more important to feed the soil. Adding organic material when planting can reduce the need for supplementary fertiliser.

Recycle clippings and other organic matter into compost to use in the vege garden.

Protect the soil with mulch:

Coarse mulch around the garden gradually breaks down to form humus, a rich plant food. In addition, it insulates the soil allowing the growth of beneficial soil organisms.

Mulch also:

- Reduces evaporation.
- Helps prevent soil erosion.
- Helps control weeds
- Insulates the soil against extremes of temperature.

Say no to toxic pesticides:

To create a healthy garden for frogs, birds, insects and family, it is critical to cut out harmful pesticides and fungicides. First consider the possible inbalances that may be causing the problem, then look for the least toxic solution.
