#### **Stylidium Pink-A-Saurus**

The Stylidium graminifolium is a striking tufted perennial with spires of pink trigger flowers. perfect as a little filler in the garden, in a pot plant arrangement and for hanging baskets. Grows to 25cm high. Great for attracting bees and butterflies.



### **Anigozanthos Bush Spirit**

A new attractive Kangaroo Paw from the Friends of Kings Park. It's flower spikes reach up to 90 cm high, with a lovely pink and cream colour. Flowers all year round. Plant in full or part sun in well-drained soils.

#### **Lucinda's Everlastings**

Lucinda's Everlastings is based in Kojonup, in the Great Southern region of Westen Australia. The everlasting business offers a form of diversification on their wheat and sheep property, which is run by Rob and Jen Egerton-Warburton, and their two daughters, Lucinda and Zara.

The business came about in 2002, with an idea inspired by Jen,

when she was gifted a bag of raw everlasting seed, stem, petals and stalks, by her colleague who also worked in the field of Landcare and native seeds. It was suggested that the seed could not be grown in large commercial quantities. The everlasting seed was scattered about and they found that quickly, they had a gorgeous display of flowers, and were surprised how easy they were to grow. After many trials and tribulations, soon enough, the size of the crop was expanded to cover a substantial area of around 10ha, as planned for 2020.



For the first few years, the seed was hand-sown and picked, but as the business has grown, Jen's husband Rob now uses the farm's seeder, fertiliser spreader, sprayer and harvester for the Everlasting crop production. Jen also uses a purpose built, and complex seed cleaner and packing machine, engineered by her father, to ensure that the product is perfect and the seed is lovely and clean of other material.

In Spring time it is such a delight to see a carpet of pink, standing out from the usual rural landscape. This view alone, makes the business an absolute worthwhile pleasure, and she loves the fact that others can experience the same through her Lucinda's Everlastings products.



### Grafted Plants



A grafted plant is one that has had the top part of one plant removed and attached to the rootstock of another plant. There are many reasons why a plant is grafted.

Seeds may produce a large variation of features in the mature plant, such as flower colour and growth habit. Grafting is used as a way to select the desired features of a plant

Another reason for grafting a plant is to make it more reliable in a wider range of soil, climate and pH. Plants that grow naturally in sandy soils may be difficult to grow in gardens with heavy soil. These plants may be grafted onto a rootstock that is more robust in a wider range of soils.

### **Grafted Plant Care**

While grafted plants are grown for added reliability, they do require slightly different care to a nongrafted plant, at least initially.

Look for the graft on the stem and monitor it regularly for the first few years. Remove any growth that appears below this graft point to avoid the rootstock taking over, losing the plant grafted on top.

For the first few years, it is beneficial to keep your grafted plant loosely staked, so that it does not break in a strong wind.

We have found that many grafted plants seem to need more regular watering for their first few years as they become established.



### **Dwarf Corymbia citriodora**

A new grafted variety to Zanthorrea, this dwarf form of the popular Lemon Scented Gum is said to only reach a height of 8m, making it a great option for smaller gardens that can't handle the 30m plus of the seed-grown form of this tree. It has a beautiful, smooth, white trunk and a lovely shady canopy, with strongly aromatic leaves, particularly when it rains, and cream coloured flowers in summer. Plant in a sunny position in free-draining soil. We only have a very limited supply of these plants for this year, so if you think you have a spot just waiting for one, please call us to reserve your tree!



#### Corymbia ficifolia

This is a very popular grafted tree that comes in a variety of flower colours from pink, to orange to the fire-engine red of the 'Muchea Red' and fuchsia-red of the 'Summer Red'. These stunning, dwarf trees will grow to a height of aound 5m and put on their large, show-stopping flower displays throughout the warmer months of the year. They will attract nectar feeding birds and insects to you garden. Plant in a sunny position in well-draining soil.



### Eremophila glandulifera 'Lipstick Pink'

A lovely medium shrub, that grows to 1.5m high with large, bright pink, tubular flowers contrasting beautifully on the grey foliage sporadically throughout the year, with the main flush of flowers in winter – spring. Plant in a sunny position in free draining soil and tip prune regularly to maintain shape. Great feature plant that will attract nectar feeding birds to your garden.



### Grevillea 'Ivory Whip'

This is a beautiful grafted grevillea which produces large, delicate, white flowers, with a hint of pink, all year round. Growing 1.5m high and wide, this medium shrub is a lovely addition to your garden that the birds will love too! Plant in a sunny to partly shaded position and free-draining soil. - Amy
