Staff Favourites

Right now, the nursery overflowing with colourful flowering plants just waiting to be discovered. We asked our staff to take on the (almost impossible!) task of choosing their favourite spring-flowering plant. Here's what they chose:



Matt's pick: Eremophila nivea 'Spring Mist'

With its striking purple flowers against silvery foliage, this hardy beauty is as tough as it is beautiful. Growing to around 1.5m x 1.5m, it thrives in well-drained soil and a full-sun position.



Clare's pick: Olearia homolepis A useful choice for coastal or cottage gardens, this shrub works well alongside Conostylis sp and Kennedia prostrata for a seasonal combination.
